Need Help with Research? See Chad Walton, Ph.D., Director of Trauma Research!

Do you have an idea for a research project keeping you awake at night, or have a set of data that you just don't have the time to analyze and publish? Or maybe you saw a grant announcement tailored towards your interests, or have some students that you would like to develop projects for? If you do, but don't have the time or experience necessary needed to launch your ideas, you are in luck! There is someone in the department that lives for these things, namely Chad Walton!

Chad joined our team nine months ago as an Assistant Professor and Director of Trauma Research, and his office is in University Tower #601. Chad received his Master's of Biomedical Technology from the University of Calgary in 2002, and PhD in Molecular BioSciences and BioEngineering at University of Hawaii in 2006. Prior to joining the Department of Surgery he was an Assistant Professor of Medicine, within the Center for Cardiovascular Research (JABSOM). Chad's past research focused on ultrasound based biomedical engineering projects, and basic molecular cardiology studies of cardiac ischemia. Chad has experience in writing successful grant applications to various local and federal agencies including, but not limited to; NIH, AHA, NSF, and Hawaii Community Foundation.

Since joining the department he has been assisting faculty, residents and students with writing grants, finding funding, and editing and submitting publications, amongst other things. He is focused on leading and mentoring research teams, with the intent to broaden our horizons for translational research and biotech innovation. His emphasis is primarily on statewide trauma research efforts with particular interest in interdisciplinary, inter-institutional and translational research efforts.

The website also contains a convenient contact form page should you want to send an idea or problem his way. Everyone is encouraged to drop in and bounce ideas off him, as he describes himself as a "serial researcher" and maintains an open door policy.


